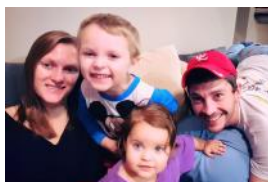

Herve Filion, 77, died June 22. Herve was a member of the Harness Racing Hall of Fame in both the United States and Canada. He retired in 2012 with a then-North American record of 15,179 victories. "God saw you getting tired and a cure not meant to be," Filion's family said on Facebook. "So he put his arms around you and whispered 'come to me.' Our dad, Herve Filion, crossed the finish line like the champion he is and became our angel today." Born in Angers, Quebec, Filion, came to the United States in 1961 and was the North American victory leader 16 times, earning his first title in 1968 and last in 1990. He had career earnings of \$88.4 million.



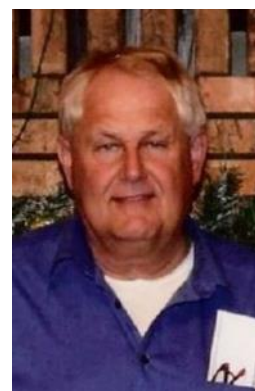
Dottie Gluhm died recently. She and her husband, Jim, lived in Trenton, FL and trained horses at Gilchrest Training Center.

James Timothy "Tim" Hackett, 63, of Cincinnati, OH died June 14. Tim was the grandson of Hall of Famer Curly Smart. At an early age he spent time with his grandfather and his father as they trained and raced horses around the country. He later followed in their footsteps training and racing himself. He was excited to have raced several times in his hometown of Delaware and was thrilled to have a horse make the final of the Little Brown Jug when he was a trainer for the Montgomery Inn Racing Team. Later, he worked for AMS Construction of Cincinnati for many years.

John D Hubbell, MD, 93, of Lima, OH, died June 27. After serving in the US Army Dr Hubbell went on to receive his Bachelor of Science and Doctor of Medicine degrees in 1952. He established an anesthesia practice in Lima, serving the community until his retirement at the age of 77. Dr Hubbell had two great sporting passions -- Buckeye football and harness racing. Dr Hubbell bred, owned and raced trotters throughout his life, usually giving the horses the surname "Adonno" so they would be easy to find in the program. He primarily raced on the Ohio fair circuit. The family would like to thank all of you in harness racing who shared fellowship with them over the years.

William E. Jacobs, 88, of Freehold died June 19. William was a rural mail carrier for the US Post Office, Freehold before his retirement. He raced and trained standardbred horses along the east coast for over 50 years.

Jack Johnson, 64, of Decatur, IL died March 23. Following graduation from college Jack worked for the Soil Conservation office for his entire career. He was heavily involved in harness racing as part of Johnson Brothers Farm. Jack was a member of the Pleasant Mills United Methodist Church.



Chris Brewer-Lehman, 81, of Wilkes-Barre, PA died June 14. While raising her family in the South Fallsburg, N.Y. area, she owned The Brewer Standardbred Agency as an equine genealogist for Standardbred racehorses and employed many in the area. She was owner of many racehorses and sire stakes winners throughout the years. She was president of the United States Harness Writers Association Monticello/Goshen Chapter.



Rodney Mitchell Jr, 65, who owned 2007 Hambletonian Oaks winner Danae, died June 21. Rodney was a successful land developer and stable owner. In addition to Danae, he also campaigned Breeders Crown 3-year-old filly pace winner Artcotic. He was the recipient of the 2007 Barasch Memorial Breakthrough Award from the US Harness Writers Association (USHWA) and was a staunch promoter of and fundraiser for the Harness Horse Youth Foundation.

Marcia Louise Stearns of Lawrenceville, PA died June 17. She began her career teaching elementary school in Farmington, NH and ended it after teaching for two decades in Yardley. She was elected and served two terms as Town Clerk of Hampstead, NH. Marcia was married for 35 years to the late Bruce Adams Stearns, who served as executive director of the New Jersey Sire Stakes Program. Previously, Bruce was publicity director at harness racetracks, including Liberty Bell in PA and Rockingham in NH. He was elected posthumously in 2002 to the Harness Racing Communicators Hall of Fame.

Charlotte L. Bean, 87, of Lees Creek, OH died May 20. Charlotte was Billy Bean's mother, a member of the Lees Creek United Church of Christ and a devoted homemaker. 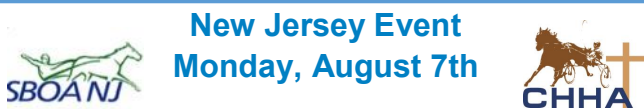
