Donald E. Huddleston (Hud), 83, died April 1. He founded the D.E Huddleston, Inc. a construction company in Chillicothe in 1971. He enjoyed harness racing. His most notable horse was his Ohio Triple Crown Winner "Peachie Pie."

Jack Kopas, 88, of Ilderton,

Ontario died recently. Jack began his career in the Standardbred racing industry in 1942. His free-for-all pacer Super Wave was inducted into the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame in 2002. He was acclaimed as the fastest and richest older pacer in





North America. He was the Canadian Trotting Association's Horse of the Year and the Older Pacer of the Year in the U.S. Jack was the Canadian Horseman of the Year in both 1969 and 1976. The future of the Kopas stable, however, and its familiar green and white colors are well in hand.

Geraldine R. Marsh, age 94, of Ellendale, DE died March 28. Retired from ACME Markets in 1982. She was a giving person who volunteered countless hours with many organizations in the local community.

David A Meirs II, VMD, 87, of Walnridge Farm, Cream Ridge,

NJ died March 27. In 1965 he established Walnridge Equine Clinic. With the advent of the New Jersey Sire Stakes program in 1972, he decided to become active in New Jersey's Standardbred industry and established Walnridge Farm. The first stallion to stand at Walnridge was Peerswick, a horse imported from New Zealand and acquired through Stanley Dancer. Besides starting the equine clinic, Dr. Meirs served on numerous Veterinary and Agricultural Boards to support most importantly the young veterinarians he helped to become the professionals they are today.

Shari L. Okusko, age 48, of Vernon, NY died April 3. Shari was employed at Kay Jewelers for over 20 years. She loved working with the harness horses that were part of her parents' stable and later with the Gary Bryant's Stable. Her whole family is involved in racing at Vernon Downs. **Delbert R. Richards**, 68, of Harrington, DE died April 4. Del was born and raised in Caribou, Maine. His love for horses led him to a career in horse racing, and training, throughout New York State and Delaware. In his free time, he enjoyed going to the casinos, and spending time at Murphys Sports Bar.



HW "Salty" Roberts, of Cooper City, FL died April 7.

Salty was the founder of the Race Track Chaplaincy of America (RTCA). Last December he was awarded the Lifetime Achievement Award by the Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association (HBPA). For over 43 years he has dedicated his life to bringing the ministry and a positive influence not only to Florida racing but race tracks worldwide.



Frank "Tag" Tagariello, 79, died March 20. Tag excelled in football and track at Farmingdale High School. He began his career under the tutelage of Joe Adamo and also worked for Eddie Cobb, George Sholty and Stanley Dancer before opening his public stable in 1965. When Pompano Park was in its infancy, Tag found success mostly with \$2,000 claimers, but, as "Tags" once said, "In this business, you start at the bottom rung on the ladder and take a step at a time. If you work hard enough, you can climb the steps of the ladder pretty quickly, but when guys like Sholty and Dancer and Haughton are campaigning, it's very tough to get to the top rung." During his "prime," Tag often worked the daynight shift, traveling by helicopter with the great Herve Filion from The Meadowlands to Roosevelt or Freehold to the New York tracks. (Thanks John Berry for the information.)

Max R. Walton, 73, died March 30 at his farm in

Newark, DE. Max loved his family, his many close friends, his valued employees, his farms, his drilling company, his Standardbred horses, his baseball teams, and his hometown of Newark. His life was fulfilled by building, inventing, and constantly being active with the next idea and next project. He most enjoyed



cocktail hour at his farm – where he hosted friends and family every Friday for a "Cheers" like gathering for over forty years – even through his long struggle with ALS. His most endearing quality was his constant willingness to help others. He was a mentor and friend to many.


CHHA Scholar Jonathan Hallett
