passion in his life was his horse farm in Cranbury, Misty Acres.

Richard "Dick" Jones, 85, of Dublin, Ohio, died July 27. He served in the US Army. He and Susan attended Gethsemane Lutheran Church. Dick was insurance manager of Commercial Union Insurance Company in Cleveland, and former associate editor for the USTA's *Hoof Beats* magazine. Dick and Susan raced horses and especially enjoyed

attending the Little Brown Jug every year.

John Fredrick Joseph, 87, of Bloomingburg, OH died Sep 4. He was a semi-tractor trailer owner and driver for many years and he also worked as an owner, driver, trainer, and breeder of standardbreds. He enjoyed working with his horses and being with his family and grandchildren.



Kenneth W. (Kenny Kirk) Kirkpatrick, 82, of New Holland, OH, died Sep 9. Kenny was a retired farmer and owner, breeder and trainer of standardbred racehorses. His father Wendell started Adios Waverly in the Little Brown Jug in 1968 and won his elimination heat, but finished seventh in the final. He was a member of the New Holland United Methodist Church where he had been a trustee.

Glenn Kuenzli, 77, of Nevada, OH, died Aug 29. Glenn worked as an electrician at Timken for 38 years. He was a

member of Emanuel United Church of Christ, Upper Sandusky. Glenn, in his early years, along with his son Mark, raised and showed Hampshire sheep and market lambs. He raised and raced standardbred horses, beginning with his father-in-law, George Gribben. He served as the Speed Superintendent of the Wyandot County Fair for many years.

Murray McConnell, 74 of Hagar, Ontario died suddenly May 5. Murray was

the owner and operator of the 160 acre Casimir Farm. He also served on numerous industry committees, with terms on

the Standardbred Canada Board of Directors as well as its Breeders Committee. He grew up in the harness racing hotbed of London, Ontario. After spending summer holidays with his family on Manitoulin Island, McConnell developed his fondness for northern



Ontario. He moved to the region in 1970, eventually fulfilling an ambition to own a farm to house his few saddle horses. Before Murray's passing, Casimir Farm stood stallions Up the Credit, Sir Luck and Daylon Frontier. It is currently home to O'Brien Award winner, Sir Luck and a long list of and other Standardbreds.

Edward Kett Mullen, 94, of Cream Ridge, NJ died on Aug

24. Ed served in the Army Air Force during World War II piloting B-29 aircraft in the Pacific. After the war, he went to work in pulp and paper eventually becoming President and CEO of the Newark Group, which he built into one of the 200 largest privately held companies in the US. Ed built and grew Fair Winds Farm in Cream Ridge into one of the foremost standardbred racehorse breeding operations in the



historic mill site in Upper Freehold Township, to the Monmouth County Park System in 1985.

Throughout his career, he was integral in the shaping of Ontario's horse racing industry. Armstrong Brothers



Farm, the family-owned operation, was founded in the 1940s by Charlie's father and uncle. Charlie kept the Armstrong horse business strong. The farm was one of the most progressive and profitable standardbred operations and bred,

raced and stood at stud a seemingly endless list of champions.


