My observations are as follows:


Michelle is enthusiastic. She is passionate about horse racing. She has outstanding public relations skills.

and worked for the paper until it closed in 1977. He then freelanced for wire services AP, UPI, and Reuters. While

at the Long Island Press, he also authored a weekly column, "Murray Janoff's Locker Room." Murray was one of the dozen chroniclers of Roosevelt Raceway who met "over hamburgers and beer" after the races on the night of May 8, 1947, to form the United States Harness Writers Association (USHWA), harness racing's leading media

organization, and was a member for 68 years. (Reportedly, "although he was too modest to admit it," both USHWA and the Tennis Writers Association originated with an idea from him.) In 2007, he was inducted into the Communicators Hall of Fame.

John "Johnny" Long, 91, died at his daughter's home in Summerville, SC on June 24. Johnny was a noted former Grand Circuit farrier who began a life-long association with horses as a youngster. A member of the US Coast Guard in World War II, he developed his blacksmithing skills while working with the mounted beach patrols in Charleston, SC. He later found employment with both Standardbred and Thoroughbred horses at racing centers in Aiken, SC, Orlando, FL and Vernon Downs.

James "Doug" Lough, 56, of Springfield, Ohio, died July 2 in his home. Doug graduated from Urbana University where he earned his bachelor of science degree. He enjoyed running and golfing, but his true passion was training and racing Standardbreds.

Herbert L. Miller, 84, of Clifton, Ohio died June 30 with his family by his side. Herbert was a farmer and became an avid harness horseman in 1966. He raced all over the United States and Canada. In his career he won top horseman and many other

accolades and achievements to his name and stable.

Alan Prince, a longtime journalist for the Miami Herald, a journalism professor at the University of Miami and 48year national officer for the U. S. Harness Writers Association (USHWA) and a harness racing Hall of Fame Communicator inductee, died June 17. He was 85.

Jim Raymer, 62, died July 8, 2015, after a brief battle with pancreatic cancer. Jim developed and trained many stakes-winning trotters, the richest being world champion Green Day, a \$1.3 million winner who captured the 2007 Yonkers Trot and finished third in the Kentucky Futurity final. He went with the trotters because he found it to be an art and pacers more of a science. He was a self-taught blacksmith and had a gift for picking out yearlings and pedigrees, as evidenced by Green Day, who he bought for just \$6,000 because he didn't see anything wrong with the horse. Rita Jay was his first horse. In addition to Green Day, those that followed included, most recently, world champion Keystone Activator (winner of the Old Oaken Bucket), Nirvana Blue Chip, Freeze Frame, and in 2014,

Harley Momma and Wouldn'titbesweet, who were stakes winners at Hoosier Park.

Patrick 'Pat' Ryan, 60, of London, Ontario died June 12. Pat was connected to a number of recognizable stakes winners,

including 2004 Confederation Cup winner Sparkler, 2007 Jugette winner Western Graduate, as well as Parlee Beach and Countryview Miss.

E. Carlyle Smith, 87 of Skaneateles, NY died July 8 after a brief bout with cancer. He was an avid horseman that purchased most of his horses at the Lexington, Harrisburg and Morrisville Yearling sales. Carlyle had the good fortune over the years of buying two eventual Elitlopp winners and one Elitlopp runner-up from the yearling catalogue pages.



Chris Valkanoff, 89, formerly of Okemos, MI and Pompano Beach, FL died March 1. Chris was a proud member of the US Navy and served in World War II on a PT Boat in the South Pacific. After the return from the war, Chris and Sophia owned the Midway Café on Cedar Street for 20+ years. Chris also worked for General Motors and retired in 1990. After retirement Chris and Sophia moved to



Pompano Beach, Florida and became active in owning standardbred harness horses. It became his passion and hobby. In 2010, a horse they bred,

Whosgoingwhosstaying, was the 2 year old horse of the year, and Sophia and Chris were standardbred breeders of the year in Florida.

Andrew "Andy" Wood, 49, of Denton, MD, died on Monday, July 6 of pancreatic cancer. Andy's dad, Ken Wood, invests his horse's purse money in drilling wells in Africa. According to Ken's website,



www.wellsforghana.org, they've drilled about 1,000 wells already. Andy was a pump installer for his dad's Denton business, Lifetime Well Drilling. Andy loved boating, crabbing, and the outdoors. He was an excellent photographer and loved flowers and walking

with his dogs in the woods.
