Who Loves You?

Bruce Ranger works tirelessly encouraging addicts to find new life in Christ. Margaret Niels has three children registered as living donors to give her a kidney in June. Parents, children and siblings help family members who are struggling. Around the track we share our grain and sandwiches. That's love. By the way, giving of ourselves is also the secret to true happiness.

Jesus came to die on the cross and open the gates of heaven so we could live forever with God (John 3:16). As Max Lucado puts it in, "The Final Week of Jesus", this was not a "last-ditch effort" to save us. No, Jesus wanted to come to suffer horrid humiliation and die an excruciating death to show just how much God loves us. Without such a gruesome show of love we may not understand the depth of God's love. God went to the extreme, giving the best possible demonstration, pulling all the stops, providing every opportunity for us to understand. Still many don't really believe God loves them. What more must God do to prove it?

When we work hard getting our horse to the races and no one is really impressed, God is proud of us. As our finances dwindle, the bills mount and no one is there to help us, God is with us, opening a door for us to step through. When we are in the hospital with no visitors, God is there. When there is no one to talk to, we can talk with God.

When we begin to understand how God is working in our lives and the lives of those around us, we are walking with the Lord. Jesus said, "Now this is eternal life:

that they know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom you have sent" (John 17:3).

Eternal life means life now and for all eternity with God. We live with God now, thinking about "all that Jesus did and taught" (Acts 1:1) and studying the scriptures to gain an understanding of how best to live in faith. What is faith? It is believing God wants what is best for us and will work with us to bring it about. While we wait, in faith we continue to live godly lives. Sometimes we slip up, thinking we know better how to find happiness. We don't!

Hebrews 11:1 tells us "faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see." The author then goes on to outline the faith of many in the scriptures who lived their faith in God even in extreme circumstances.

So what does Jesus ask of us? To love God with all our heart, mind and soul



and to love our neighbors as we love ourselves (Matthew 22:37-39). Who is our neighbor? How do we best show our love for God? Remember, God lives in all the strangers, family members and friends we meet each day. When we love these people as Jesus does, we love God. As the hymn says,

"They'll know we are Christians by our love."

Let's joyfully reach out in love and friendship to those around us as family, guarding their dignity and providing for their needs. This is how we spread the news that God is in our land and how we praise God from whom all good things come.

History of They'll Know We Are Christians by Our Love

Peter Raymond Scholtes wrote the hymn "They'll Know We Are Christians by Our Love" while he was a parish priest at St. Brendan's on the South Side of Chicago in the 1960s. At the time, he was leading a youth choir out of the church basement, and was looking for an appropriate song for a series of ecumenical, interracial events. When he couldn't find such a song, he wrote the now-famous hymn in a single day. His experiences at St. Brendan's, and in the Chicago Civil Rights movement, influenced him for the rest of his life.

Peter had a profound impact on those who loved him, and on many more who never met him. He was blessed with amazing talents, and shared them generously with people all over the world. Throughout his life--whether as a priest, musician-composer, social worker, teacher, community organizer, therapist, author, or consultant--Peter had a genius for making complex and important ideas easy to grasp and put to use. He was confident in his convictions, but embraced differences, and cherished his friendships that bridged cultures and countries.

After working in the public sector in Lynn, Massachusetts, and Madison, Wisconsin, Peter became a management consultant traveling the globe to help businesses engage employees' talents more fully, humanely, and effectively.

It is interesting that CHHA member, Gary Cartwright, who is also a management consultant, told me this is a favorite hymn of the men who participate in his prison ministry. What's more interesting is that I met Peter Scholtes and sold his management books while working as CFO for a management research and consulting organization, GOAL/QPC. However, I never knew of his ministry or realized he authored this famous hymn. It is a small world. Yes, we are one in the Lord!

Mr. Anonymous and his wife thank you for your prayers. Surgery went great! Tumor is benign. All is well. God is good!

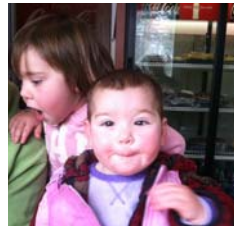
Praise God! Bob Cain came through his knee replacement surgery with flying colors.

racing community. He owned, trained and raised Standardbreds with exceptional skill and patience.

Louis J. Brigandi Sr., 82, of Hicksville, N.Y., died April 19. He campaigned his horses, including 1987 New York-bred stakes winner National Way, on the New York circuit and enjoyed jogging horses at Roosevelt Raceway.



Gary Collins, who raced in New England. died recently.

Gratien Deschenes, 89, of Quebec died April 17. Gratien, a driver and trainer and breeder, was known for picking out and developing the great trotting mare Grades Singing. The mare was inducted to the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame in 1996.



Mickey DiFranco, a driver, trainer, owner who raced in NY and CA, died prematurely.

Barbara Elrod died the week of April 6. She was 71. She was the companion to Ray Lineweaver for 30 years. Barbara worked in the race office at Rosecroft Raceway for many years and also managed the track's dorms.

Normand Richard (Norm) Fluet Sr., 59, of Aberdeen, NC, died April 24. He was born in Sherbrooke, Quebec but has lived and raised his family in the states for the past 45 years. Norm followed his father into harness racing and became a very successful driver and trainer. He had a natural gift when working with trotters and breaking babies in preparation for handling and racing. In 2007 Norm stopped driving and passed the reins to his son, Phillip. Norm, Phillip, and Lori worked closely together preparing yearlings down south and racing them in the northeast.



Paul "Biff" Lowry, 87, a racing publicist and executive for more than 50 years died April 9 in St. George, UT. Biff started his career in racing in 1947. He became publicity director and later assistant general manager for Western Harness, which operated harness meets at both Hollywood Park and Santa Anita Park in the late 1940s and 1950s. In 1968 he went to the Red Mile eventually becoming president and GM 1981.



Greg MacDonald, 86, formerly of Sydney, Nova Scotia and Smyrna, DE, died April 13, as a result of heart failure. Greg began his driving career in 1962 north of the border having great success with the pacer, Bob Brook. In 1963 he made the break to the U.S., working as second trainer for the late Hugh Bell. Greg trained many \$100,000 winners. He last drove in 1988 at Monticello Raceway. An accomplished all around horseman he was seen in his later years sitting in



his pickup trackside watching training miles with his Jack Russell, Lizzy by his side.

Chuck McCann, who raced in New England, died recently.

Doris Niccum, 86 of Fowlerville, MI died April 15 after a brief illness following hip surgery. She was the mother of trainers Don and Stan Niccum and longtime U.S. Trotting Association tattoo technician Richard Niccum. Doris worked as a secretary at the University of Illinois and in the South Lyon, Mich., public school system. Of course, she always helped with the family stable. A huge fan of the sport, she loved to watch harness racing on RTN on a daily basis.

Edward R. Razzetti, 79, Hasbrouck Heights, NJ, first vice present of the Standardbred Breeders & Owners Association of New Jersey (SBOANJ) and a board member for nearly three decades, passed away April 5. "Ed was one of the finest men I ever knew," said SBOANJ President Tom Luchento. "He always provided good counsel to me and to the SBOANJ. He was my right hand man. I will miss him dearly. All of us at the SBOANJ send our condolences to his family." An Army veteran, he was the owner of Fairmount Car and Truck Leasing in Hackensack for 50 years. Ed was a devoted horse owner and breeder for many years, racing horses at various tracks, including the Meadowlands. He was the longest serving member of the SBOANJ.

Renee Ross, wife of Wally Ross, Jr, had an aneurism and died this week at her home in Margate, FL while she was caring for her handicapped daughter.

Rose Sinclair passed away on April 1 and entered into the presence of Jesus, her God and Savior after a courageous battle with cancer. Rosie and her husband Michael Sinclair raced in Ontario. Rosie's infectious smile and positive attitude will be greatly missed by those that knew her.

Anthony Michael Strollo, 76, died April 26 after a long battle with Parkinson's disease. Tony was a retired Standardbred trainer and driver at Batavia Downs, Buffalo Raceway, Yonkers Raceway, the Meadowlands and Garden State Park. "Tony was one of the nicest guys you'll ever meet around a racetrack," said Todd Haight, Director/GM of Live Racing at Batavia Downs. "One of few just left handed drivers on the Western New York circuit; he was notorious for bringing home some long priced winners."

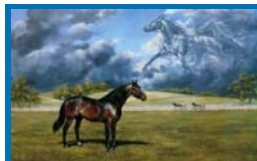
