I'm Amazed!By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Wait until you see the faith statements, accomplishments and dreams of this year's scholarship recipients! I was so blown away reading their applications that I appealed to one of our members who made a nice donation so we could help more students. You too will be amazed with these hard-working kids from harness racing families.

As I sat on the deck marveling at the fast growing tomatoes, basil, mint and parsley and enjoying all God's creation around me, I began to think about all the amazing people in harness racing and our

CHHA partners in ministry.

Reading through the Gospels, there are only two times where Jesus is amazed. Both have to do with someone's faith. The first is when Jesus went home to Nazareth. He amazed the people with his teaching and because of his reputation for

healing. Yet because they knew him when he was a kid they refused to believe Jesus was anything special. Jesus was so amazed at their lack of faith that He didn't do many miracles there (Matthew 13:58 and Mark 6:5-6).

After speaking to everyone on the mountainside (Luke 6:12-49), Jesus went to Capernaum. A centurion there—that is, a Roman soldier—sent some Jewish elders to Jesus asking Him to come and heal his young servant who was sick and about to die (Luke 7:2-3). Generally Roman soldiers did not really care much about their servants. This centurion was different.

Understandably, Jews stayed away from the Romans, especially Roman soldiers. However, the centurion did not hesitate to ask the Jewish elders to speak to Jesus on his behalf. They gladly went to Jesus and begged him to help their

Gentile friend who actually built their synagogue (Luke 7:4). This Gentile made a sizable donation to give the people a decent place to worship God. He chose to participate in what God was doing and to help others grow in their faith.

Jesus was convinced. He went with them and was almost at the man's house when the centurion's servants came running with another message from their master. Even in his grief, the centurion, aware of Jewish religious customs, did not want to make Jesus have to enter a Gentile house. The centurion, humbly sent the message, "I do not deserve to have you come" to my house (Luke 7:7).

In perfect faith he had his

servants explain how he tells those under his authority to "go and they go" or "to come and they come" (Luke 7:8). They relayed the message from the centurion for Jesus to just "say the word and my servant will be healed" (Luke 7:8). The centurion trusted Jesus 100%.

When Jesus heard this he was amazed at him, and turning to the crowd that followed Him, he said, "I tell you, not even in Israel have I found such faith" (Luke 7:9).

The centurion believed in Jesus even though he never met him or heard him preach. He just simply trusted Jesus to heal the servant whom he loved. "Then the men who had been sent returned to the house and found the servant well" (Luke 7:10).

So, is Jesus "amazed" with our faith? If not, what has to change? Faith is a gift from God to us. As with all the gifts God gives us, the more we use it, the more it grows. Remember, I was so amazed with our scholarship candidates, I had to raise additional funds so we could bless them more. I pray Jesus is even more amazed with your faith.



Obituaries (Cont.)

Dr Gordon Gilbertson, DVM, 95, of Kent County Ontario, died. Dr Gilbertson's hands on training and driving experience and treating horses as a veterinarian helped him revolutionize the way horses are tied into jog carts and race bikes by inventing the Quick Hitch. In 1980, Dr.Gilbertson secured Canadian and US patents.



Hilda Heydt, 89, of Pleasant Hill, OH, a pioneer of women in harness racing, died April 29. Hilda was born in Germany. In 1936 she and her parents fled to Holland and later to Johannesburg, South Africa to escape the Holocaust. Following her parents' divorce she moved with her father in 1938 to New York. She attended Penn State University and moved to Lexington where she began as a groom in harness racing. This started her on a career that spanned seven decades. Women in harness racing in the 1940's were not given the opportunities that men were, but Hilda helped break through those barriers gaining her training license in 1949 and becoming one of only three women to hold such a license. She went on to train and breed many top horses including the world champion Torrid, Mr. Budlong. Hilda had no siblings and never married or had children. She made harness racing and her love for horses her life. Her breeding farm in Pleasant Hill remains and is now owned and operated by Rick and Margie Polhamus. Kim and Ross Hankins's Grandmother, Neva Burright, who began her career in 1916 was another woman license holder. I wonder who the third woman harness racing pioneer was.

Wayne Hyatt, 69, died May 26. Wayne earned his traning and driving licenses while working for Ezra Eads. He worked for many trainers over the years. Later he became the farm manager for Mr. Joel Black's Killydonnell farm, at Sahbra Farm in OH, for Ed Ryan in PA, and for Dr. Nick Loutsion's farm in Canonsburg, PA. He also operated a small stable, racing mostly at Northfield Park. In 1995 Wayne retired from racing and moved to Texas with two broodmares and raised a number of nice horses, usually selling the yearlings in Canada.

Gerald D "Bear" Keene, 72, of Batavia, NY, died May 5. Bear was a trainer at Batavia and Buffalo. During his career his trainees won 149 races. His best season came in 2008 when he conditioned 33 winners. He also enjoyed farming and was always there for his children.

Bill Davis Langley of BC, 54, died. For decades, Bill dominated the harness racing scene on Canada's west coast. Originally from Ontario, he made the move west in the early 1980s. Bill was a two-time O'Brien Award winner, receiving the O'Brien Award of Horsemanship in 2003 and again in 2014. That year, Mr. Davis rebuilt his stable after losing a number of horses in a barn fire that June.

Rick MacLeish, 66, of Ocean City, NJ died May 30. Rick

was a three-time National Hockey League all-star and a longtime Standardbred owner. He was a Standardbred racehorse enthusiast and he owned several horses since purchasing one for \$5,000 while a minor leaguer in the Boston Bruins system.

William Larry "Bill" Nibert, 80, of Richwood, OH, died May 14. Bill is a veteran of the United States Navy. Bill bought Nelson Blue's insurance agency in Richwood and started Nibert Insurance, which continues operations to this day. He served as mayor for more than 25 years and as a director of the Ohio Harness Horsemen's Association.



John N. Perrin, 65, died May 26. John, the son of the late Illinois Harness Horsemen's Hall of Fame member, Dorman and Elizabeth Perrin, was well known throughout Midwest race tracks.

Arthur George Shaw, 77, of Jensen Beach, FL, died June 5. Arthur earned a law degree from Northern Illinois University. Then he followed in his dad's footsteps and became a leading Standardbred driver, driving horses from New York to California. He was one of the top driver/trainers in the country. He was also one of the first single importers to import Standardbreds from New Zealand to the United States. Later on in life he pioneered the dual hemisphere Standardbred stud service in the US where in the off season he would fly the horses to New Zealand to stand for stud. Arthur and his wife, DeDe also built the largest Shaklee business in the world.

C. Richard "Dick" Stambaugh, 69, of Union Bridge, MD died May 14. His wife Cheryl "Cheri" administers the Maryland Standardbred Race Fund. He served in the U.S. Army, seeing action in Vietnam. Dick enjoyed gardening, working outdoors and tinkering in his shop. He was employed as an electrician with Lehigh Cement Co. of Woodsboro for many years and was

also a milk truck driver and an independent long-haul truck driver.

Thomas H. York Jr, 92, or Newark, OH, died May 17. He

began his career in the wood business. By 1958, he had become a successful full-time log buyer and eventually became the vice president of procurement for the Dean Company. Thomas moved to Zanesville, OH, and purchased Southeast Ohio Timber, as well as a pallet company, Industrial Crate and Lumber. He also had a passion for Standardbred racehorses and devoted 30-plus years to being deeply



involved in the sport as an owner and breeder, working with trainers Terry Holton and most recently, Jim Arledge Jr. He and his wife, Kathy, loved to travel the country to spend time with friends and watch their horses compete.

Obituaries

Sharron Ruth Adams, 76, died May 20 at her home in Bellville, Ohio, with her loving family by her side. Sharron, born in Ontario in 1939, moved to the US with her husband, Albert in 1962. Later they became proud American citizens. Sharron was a strong, loving and caring wife, mother, grandmother, nana and friend. Among her many interests were walking on Winterwood Farm, the



family's horse farm that she helped create, maintain and operate. She was also a wonderful planner and her organizational skills were second to none. She enjoyed holidays and birthdays and particularly having the family together and making each family member smile. She was a beacon of strength and even in her final days encouraged all family members to remain strong. Neighbors and friends will also remember the famous coffee cakes prepared especially with love. While Sharron was never boastful, she strived for perfection in everything she did. The world has an emptiness created in her absence, but all gained immeasurably by knowing her. Anthony "Tony" DePaloa, 80, of Toms River, NJ died June 4 of complications from surgery. He proudly served in the United States Army then went on to work for the United States Post Office for 38 years. In 2014 he was appointed to the New Jersey Racing Commission. Morton Finder, 82, of Brooklyn, NY, died June 1. Morton raced horses at Yonkers Raceway, the now-defunct Roosevelt Raceway, The Meadowlands and other leading harness racetracks throughout the country dating back to the 1950s. He was part of 1966 Triple Crown champion Romeo Hanover. He was also an astute and successful handicapper. In 1971 Pine Hollow Stud Farm was recognized as the New York State Breeder of the Year. In later years he bred and owned many stakes winners and was part of the syndicate that owned the great pacer Niatross. He was known for his philanthropy, prorting such charities as Henry Street Settlement.


