# Who Urges You On By Chaplain Lee Alphen

My father died suddenly when I was seven years old. My whole family was devastated. They told me Daddy was in heaven with God and that I could still talk to him. I did. It also occurred to me that if my father was up in heaven with God, I better be a good girl and I should go to church. God was important to my father, my grandmother and my grandfather. They all encouraged me in my faith.

Many years later, when I was studying for my master's degree in theology, I realized that, at some point in my life, I stopped talking to my earthly father in heaven and began to talk with Our Father in heaven. My daddy brought me to the throne of God and left me there.

We all have people in our lives who encourage us. Some encourage us to do good; others not so much. Who encourages you in the race of life? Did your parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles or neighbors encourage you and set a good example? Perhaps it was the person next to you in the shed row whose great attitude, good work ethic, and respect for those around them you attributed to their faith in Jesus and were impressed.

"By faith people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land" (Hebrews 11:29). Trusting God, David killed the giant, Goliath, with a sling shot (1 Samuel 17:49). 

Foods) and retired after 35 years. He was very active in the Asbury United Methodist Church in Harrington, DE where he held many offices over the years. He helped coach a Harrington Little League team and looked forward to and enjoyed golfing trips and hunting trips with his friends. His biggest pastime and passion was with breeding, raising, training and racing horses. He also enjoyed having a large garden each year with plenty of vegetables to share with family and friends.

Robert "Bob" Goth, 62, of Muncie, IN, died July 13. Bob was involved with harness racing all of his life. For the last 35 years, he was very active as an owner, breeder, trainer and driver of horses, thus continuing a line that includes three generations of horse trainers. For many of those years he



successfully raced horses on the tough Chicago circuit. In high school be began drag racing and enjoyed much success in the sport throughout the United States. When his Grandpa in Portland became terminally ill and needed someone to help with his horses, Charles quickly stepped-up, moved to Portland, and not only helped care for his grandparents, but changed his love for car racing to horse racing.

Harry Harvey, 92, died July 17. Harry, the Vermont-born son of a dairy farmer trained and drove Albatross. During World War II, he helped his father select green draft horses in Montreal, to be shipped by rail to the family farm. Harry helped train and sell the horses, in demand due to war-time restrictions on gas and oil. He saw harness racing at Vermont fairs. In 1951 he joined the Delvin Miller Stable in 1951. Miller entered Elgin and Charles Armstrong's filly, Helicopter, in the Hambletonian. Miller and his other second trainers drove horses with better prospects, but in the 23-horse field, going three heats,

Harvey and Helicopter prevailed. The next year, he left the racetrack to manage Miller's Meadow Lands (PA) Farm, where Adios was beginning his career as the sport's dominant sire. It was Harvey who suggested the mare Countess Vivian be bred to Dale Frost when Adios was battling the effects of laminitis. The



mating produced Meadow Skipper. In 1965, Harry bought the Meadow Lands Farm annex where he lived and started his own Arden Hills Farm and racing stable at nearby Arden Downs, the Washington County fairgrounds. It was at Arden Downs that Albatross, a son of Meadow Skipper, arrived in November of 1969, and where he was trained until sold in May of 1971 and moved to trainer Stanley Dancer a few weeks before the start of his -year3-old racing season. Harvey drove the colt through a 14 for 17 season and top juvenile pacing colt honors for 1970 and prepared him that winter and the following spring. Harry was elected to the Harness Racing Hall of Fame in 2001 and continued to operate a public stable until 2009.

George T. Luchento, 67, of Easton, PA died August 5. George was Tom Luchento's brother. He received his Master's Degree from Seton Hall, NJ, and also attended Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, NY. George was a Vice President of Information Technology for National Starch and Chemical Co. He enjoyed playing Racquetball, dealing cards at the Casino, gambling,

His lifelong passion was harness racing, and he will be remembered for his positive attitude, great sense of humor, and generosity. His motto in life was "All my stories may not



be true, but they were all good stories." He always managed to light up a room with his witty personality, the sparkle in his eye, and a smile on his face. He never once missed an opportunity to tell a great story.

Tracey Marlene Miller, 51, of Washington, PA died July18. Tracey worked as a loan service manager for Chrome Credit Union. She was a fixture at the Meadows for many years within the owner's club and was very active with Relay For Life. Her greatest joy in life was her boys. Pastor Joe DiDonato officiated at Tracey's funeral and her son, Preston's, wedding the same week.

Mario Nodari, 85, of Fairfield, NJ died Aug 10. Mario was a blacksmith farrier in the New Jersey area for many years. As a young boy, he learned the art of horse shoeing from his father, Antonio, in his home town, Montecchio, Maggiore, Italy. There was a distinct pride that Mario brought to his work and was known to say "I love what I'm doing and I know that I'm good at it, as were my father and grandfather."

Charles "Ronnie" R. Park, 81, of Chillicothe, Ohio died July 21. Ronnie owned and operated an antique furniture store for many years. He enjoyed many hobbies and activities, but his true passion was being a Standardbred driver and owner.

Nathan A. Price, 36, of Wickhaven, PA died July 19. Nathan was self-

employed as an electrician. He had an incredible love for all animals, especially horses. He was a 3rd generation horseman at the Meadows Racetrack and Casino where he went every day to train his pacing filly, Elegantly Vicious. Nathan also loved to fish and hunt. A true 'lightning bolt' for love and friendship, he deeply touched all who knew him.



Robert B. Reid, 75, of Mansfield, Ohio, died July 18 in Parry Sound, Ontario. In 1964 Robert moved to Mansfield to start his career at Gold Bond Building Products as the National Sales Manager. His customers and business associates became lifelong friends throughout the United States. He was a competitive athlete, who continued to play softball, basketball and golf his entire life. He



immensely enjoyed traveling to Las Vegas, Florida, the family cabin in Canada, going on cruises, and being around his Standardbred race horses. Robert had friends in every aspect of his life; fraternity brothers, softball friends, and business friends. He was a very generous and giving person,

David A. Spaziano, 76, of Rochester, NY, died July 25. According to his family, "Horses and horse racing were his heart and soul." David drove home 152 winners during his harness racing career. His trainees won over 70 races. Some of his most popular horses include Scorpion Prince and Passion Time. His last driving win came at Buffalo Raceway on Nov. 12, 1997, behind Handsome Boy.

Patricia Jo Wald, 63, of Washington, died July 17. Her husband, Ray races at The Meadows. Patricia was a foster mother, taught medical assistant classes at Penn Commercial and was a member of Citywide Development Corporation. She loved horses, gardening and her dogs.

**George Berkner**, 74, July 28. George, affectionately known as "B", was born and raised in the Inwood section of Manhattan and established his career at Roosevelt and Yonkers Raceway. It was at the Meadowlands that his career really took off. George



stunned the crowd and won their hearts driving B.G.'s Bunny to a track record and the horse later became one of the pioneer stallions in the New Jersey breeding program. Later, when George began to train instead of drive, he had enormous success with "Hit the Bid", "Goalie Jeff" and "Argyle Laddie". All who knew George would describe him as a caring, compassionate, loving and generous man. He packed in a lot of life in his seventy-four years.

John R. Eades, 67, of London, Ohio died Aug 6. It was perhaps fitting that John, who dearly loved training trotters, died unexpectedly while watching the broadcast of the Hambletonian. He began working for Delvin Miller in the 1960s as a groom while was attending the University of Kentucky in Lexington. He had such a strong interest in European racing, that he attracted the attention of legendary French horseman and breeder J-P Dubois, and he later trained many horses for Dubois in the United States. In recent years he has trained a small

stable, including trotters owned by his brother David, who was mayor of London, Ohio for more than 25 years.

Jeffrey Raymond "JR" Eidens Jr, 27, of Washington, died July 22. After graduating from Washington Area Career and Technology Center, he was

"He just loved getting up in the morning and going to the barn to get a horse ready," said his wife, Marcia. As year-round Pinehurst residents, the Emersons became active in working to ensure the training center in the center of the resort village was maintained for horses and not developed, and the historic barn on the grounds was restored.


