Our Rich Inheritance By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Have you ever had a free-legged pacer? In the early 70s, most trotters and a few pacers were free-legged. Dan Patch never wore hopples. In a 2009 Harnesslink.com article. John Manzi said, "Back when Dan Patch was racing it was rare to see a pacer with hopples!" However, John says it is rare to see free -legged trotters or pacers anymore. Last July at the Lee County Fair, CHHA member Wilda McDanel's free-legged pacer, Rockme Amadeus, broke a track record set in 1939.

The U.S. Declaration of Independence declared the country's dependence on God. The closing words of the Declaration solemnly state: "With a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor." God is mentioned four times in the 1,300 word document.

He wrote, "This is all the Inheritance I can give to my dear family, The religion of Christ can give them one which will make them rich indeed."

Moses reminds the Israelites. "The Lord your God is bringing you into a good land of flowing streams and pools of water" (Deuteronomy 8:7 NLT). Moses goes on to tell them about the bounty of the land. Then he says, "But that is the time to be careful! Beware that in your plenty you do not forget the Lord your God and disobey his commands, regulations, and decrees that I am giving you today" (Deuteronomy 8:11 NLT).

Jesus went to Nazareth with His disciples. On the Sabbath, He taught in the synagogue. Unfortunately, the people did not want to hear what Jesus had to say. They didn't think He was important enough to listen to. They had no faith in Him, so He was not able to do any miracles there.

Obituaries

Dr. James E. (Doc) Bennett, 93, died June 21. Doc Bennett was a gifted leader in the reconstructive plastic surgery profession and received many awards during his years as a surgeon and professor. After retirement he realized a lifelong dream, establishing Benaire Farm in Morgan County, Indiana and spending the next 30 years



breeding and racing Standardbred horses. He started in harness racing as an owner in 1981, and his first star was Raven's Arrow, an Indiana Sires Stakes winner in 1981. He went on to breed more than 10 sub-2:00 trotters and won breeding awards in 2000 and 2001. His crowning racing achievement was having his finest broodmare, Crunchess, inducted into the Indiana Standardbred Hall of Fame in 2014. Always an advocate of racing, he played a role in making pari-mutuel racing a reality in the state of Indiana.

Susan Brickell, 67, of FL, died May 19 one month before her 68th birthday. Susan was one of the most stalwart of supporters and workers on the Pennsylvania fair circuit. She won the 2008 US Harness Writers Association Mary Lib Miller Award. She served as Clerk of Course at the majority of fairs in Pennsylvania over the last couple of decades, and as race secretary, charter, and a board member of the Pennsylvania Fair Harness Horsemen's Association. She trained a generation of people how to serve in the various functions needed to keep the fairs going.

Audrey W. Christman, 80, of Washington, PA, died March 28. She served for several years as a nurse and night supervisor in Washington County Hospital before

becoming a full time mother to four children. She assisted her husband, Walter Christman, in the management of Christman Trucking which operated local and over-the-road trucking, Christman Air Freight, Christman Air System, an air charter and commuter



regional airline, and Travel Concepts, a travel agency. Along the way, she qualified as a single-engine aircraft pilot. She was an avid quilter, and her quilts were displayed in conventions across the nation in recent years. Her son, Mark Christman, races at the Meadows.

Michael Guy Cox, 62, of Ada, MI, died June 9. One of his great true personal passions was being involved in the Standardbred horse business as the co-owner of Suttons Bay Racing with his wife, Linda. He spent a lot of that time pouring through yearling books or discussing what draw would work best for which horse in the early part of the week. His goal was to win the Breeders Crown. Michael would be happy to know his family said they, "Feel so blessed to appreciate and be involved in his passion for the horse racing business."

David G. Eades, 77, of London, OH, died June 5. His 3 year old filly trot in 2:00 in her first life time race on June 6th. After retiring from General Motors, Dave served as Mayor of London from 1992-2015. He was a US Navy Veteran. Dave was a member of the American Legion, the First United Methodist Church, the US Trotting Association, Ohio Mayor's Association and was a past president of the following: London Kiwanis, Ohio Municipal League, Madison County Fish and Game and Madison County Harness Horseman's Association.

Becca Galloway, 21, of Otsego, MI, died June 27. Becca was double majoring in Criminal Justice and Psychology at Grand Valley State University. She had a passion for helping people and her heart desired to help convicts on probation become productive members of society. She also wanted nothing more than to rescue horses. Her plan was to work at a therapeutic equine riding center and eventually to found and run her own. Becca had a passion for harness racing.

Robert Gary Gray, 56, of New England, died June 10. Robert learned to drive trucks in the Army. After his discharge, he drove everything from commercial tractor-trailers to horse transportation vans making many friends while shipping race horses all over New England and the Northeast for years. His true passion was always harness racing. He and his father and later his children all enjoyed the races together as a family affair. He was an amateur driver his whole life and competed in the Billings as well as amateur races in Maine and Massachusetts. He also trained a small stable.

Stella Hagemeyer, 96, died June 12. Stella and her husband, Maynard, moved to the

husband, Maynard, moved to the family farm near Clarksville, Ohio, in 1947. She had a passion for volunteering with church, community, 4H and political organizations and received many honors and awards. Stella worked as a Clerk of Course at 10 County Fairs in Ohio for 40 years. She also served



as Secretary-Treasurer of the Dr. H.M. Parshall Futurity for 22 years. Stella received several honors from the Ohio Harness Horse Association and the United States Trotting Association and received the "Rambling Willie" award for her lifetime work with harness horses. CHHA knows of Stella best in her role in helping to operate her family's standardbred racing and breeding business with her son, Scott, and granddaughter, Lyndsey.

Ralph Lewis Holloway, 92, of Frankford, DE, died June 5. Ralph was a harness horse breeder, owner, trainer and driver. He served his country during World War II. After the war he became an agent in tax accounting, farmer, and as a harness horseman. Ralph's career in public service was extraordinary. He served on the school board, was a volunteer fire fighter, was elected to the Frankford Town Council and later as Mayor. He was also elected as the First Vice President of the Delaware Standard Bred Owners Association (DSOA) for over 20 years. Ralph was a member of Frankford United Methodist Church.

Barbara R. Jenkins, 84, of Charlottetown, PEI, died June 5. Barbara will be remembered for her kind and nurturing way, the love and devotion to her husband and family, and her service to her community (Red Cross, FISH, Lillibets, CNIB, Y's Menettes). She is Ann MacNeill's mother.

Antoinette "Toni" L. Linden, 104, has died. She owned Sly Attorney, a world record holding harness horse.

Mike MacDonald, 70, of PEI, died June
19. Mike, a legend in the Prince Edward
Island harness racing community, was inducted into the
Prince Edward Island Sports Hall of Fame in
2009. He won a record-setting five Gold Cup and Saucer
races over his 45-year harness career, which was largely
based at Blue Bonnets racetrack in Montreal. Mike never
forgot his Island roots and always came back every Old
Home Week with top horses to support the Charlottetown
Driving Park.

Peter L. Rhulen, 79, died on June 2. Peter spent over three decades helping to build Rhulen Agency into one of the biggest privately held specialty insurance agencies in North America. He was recognized as having the largest animal mortality insurance program in the US and was a well-respected authority on standardbred horse racing. He

devoted a significant amount of time and resources to establishing the Sullivan Country Recovery Center in the mid 80s, a treatment facility for alcohol and drug addiction. One of Peter's greatest pleasures was going to the track to watch his horses train and race. And he held on to that passion through his very last days.

Charles Thomas "Tom" Sells, 72, of West Alexander, PA, died June 1. While still in high school, Tom began exercising thoroughbreds and then became a Standardbred groom for Dick Buxton on weekends and during the summers. Eventually Dick entrusted some horses to Tom to train. When Tom was 30, he began training and catch driving at the Meadows. His career statistics are impressive, totaling 2,635 driving wins for purse earnings of \$15.4 million and 184 training wins good for \$972,700 purse earnings. The later part of his career was spent as one of the top drivers at Pompano Park, where many seasons he was in the top 10 standings. He was inducted into the Florida Harness Racing Hall of Fame in 2015 by the Florida Chapter of the United States Harness Writer's Association.

James Daryl "Jim" Thompson, 84, of Danville, KY, died May 29. He bred and raced horses under the banner of Fountain Valley Farm. Among Mr. Thompson's most accomplished performers were the homebreds Duke Duke and Whittingham. Mr. Thompson graduated from Oneida Baptist Institute where his grandfather, Reverend D. Chester Sparks, was president. Jim served his country as a navigator in the United States Air Force. He graduated from the University of Kentucky. He retired from Farmers National Bank of Danville as Senior Vice President of Marketing and Business Development after 33 years of service.

Russell Tippin, Jr, 67, of Shady Cove, OR, died May 23. His wife, Brenda, is a CHHA member.

Stanley Zombick, 90, of Clinton, NY, died May 29.

Stanley served his country faithfully during World War II and the Korean War as a United States Marine. He was employed by General Electric. His true passion was horse racing and training, which he did at Vernon Downs for more than 60 years. He was a past director of the Harness Horse Association of Central New York. He will always be remembered as a loving father and grandfather.



Parker Steck was awarded the Rambling Willie scholarship to pursue a nursing degree at Ashland University. Parker says,

"In July of 2014 my entire family's life was changed forever. While on his way to work, my older brother, Ryder, was involved in a car accident. He passed away on August 2, 2014. It was during those days at Grant Medical Center that I realized that becoming a nurse was what I wanted to do with my life.



My family has always been active in our church. I am raised to believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross to save me from my sins, and that He went to prepare a place for us to reign with Him forever. I also know God does not give you more than you can handle, but when you lose someone so young, so full of life, with such a bright future ahead of him many people may question God's plan. Not my family! Of course, we miss Ryder and my parents still struggle everyday with their grief but have never wavered in their faith that God's plan is not our business.

Going through life, I learned that we are not promised tomorrow. We may never get another change to be kind to someone. That is why it is so important for me to be kind and forgiving.
