Ray bred his \$175 mare for the third time to his father's stallion giving him a colt. In time he began training the colt in the Indiana corn fields where his dad had created a couple of training tracks. When he got him down to 2:45, Ray began racing him at the Ohio fairs.

One of Bob's grooms told him about Ray's horse. Bob and his wife, a prayerful Christian woman, went to check him out. After waking from a nap in the car, she told Bob the horse would have one white leg, and she said God was blessing the purchase. Bob thought she was crazy.

Sure enough, Bob's thorough examination revealed one white leg, a decent confirmation, build and gait. Bob's wife was ecstatic to hear her birthday gift was half the horse.

Mary was planning to marry a humble carpenter and live a simple life. She probably never expected to set foot outside of Nazareth. She didn't have any grand ideas except to serve God and 2003. He also won the US Pacing be a good wife and mother.

Perhaps Mary was daydreaming about her life in her own house with Joseph when an angel came to visit her. In a flash, her world changed. The angel said she had found favor with God. She was chosen and blessed and would be the mother of God. "How can this be?" she asks (Luke 1:34). The angel tells her, "Nothing is impossible with God" (Luke 1:37). The Holy Spirt filled her with peace, and joyfully Mary went to visit her elderly cousin, Elizabeth, who needed her. The angel also said Elizabeth was six months pregnant. Wow! Rambling Willie was inducted into the United States Harness Racing Hall of Fame in 1997 and into the Indiana Standardbred Hall of Fame in Championship and the Canadian Pacing Derby 3 times.

"When Willie died, Bob Farrington was asked what he had seen in Willie that others missed. Bob quoted legendary thoroughbred trainer "Sunny" Jim Fitzsimmons, 'The most important thing about a racehorse, you can't see.'"1

Mary knew what the angel was offering would not be easy. However, she knew it was God's offer, and that God would be with her helping her through the difficult parts. She knew in the end everything would turn out so well that the journey would be worth it.

William "Bill" Gale, 70, died Nov 19. Bill was one of Canada's leading drivers during the 70s, 80s and 90s. Between 1982 and 1997, Gale recorded 16 consecutive \$1 million-plus seasons. In the fall of 1991 at Pompano Park, he won



a pair of Breeders Crown Championships. Also in 1994, he received the O'Brien Award as Canada's Driver of The Year ,and in 2015 he was inducted into the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame.

Terry Lee Kibler, 60, of Woodstock, VA died Nov 26. Terry was the owner of Kibler's Furniture in Woodstock for more than 30 years and ran a successful harness racing business. He was past president and current board member of the Shenandoah County Fair Association, and Secretary of Harness Racing at

the Fair. "Terry got involved in every



aspect of racing you can think of," said Woodstock based trainer Betsy Brown, who trained and coowned horses with Kibler. "If someone needed a hand to help paddock a horse, jog a horse, tack a shoe on or anything else, Terry was there to help. "

Harald Lunde, 72, died in Norway. He was regarded as one of the top Norwegian horsemen and enjoyed success in his native country as well as North America..

Melissa Dawn MacNeill, 40, of Stratford, PEI, died Nov 24 from a stroke. Her father, Don MacNeill, races harness horses in PEI.

Robert J. "R.J." Moore, 61, died Nov 3. RJ was the track superintendent at Hoosier Park from 1999 to 2011. He had been track superintendent for Hollywood Gaming since 2014. He was also owner and operator of Track and Construction by RJ for the past five years. He enjoyed harness racing. fishing, logging and his work.



James "Jim" P. Patten, 90, of Davenport, IA, died Nov 20. Jim proudly served in the U.S Army during the Korean War. Jim founded Midwest Publishing & Co. He was a successful entrepreneur who established or operated many businesses over the years including the Quad City Downs. His hobbies included a love of fishing and horse racing.



Dave Sabatelli, 53, died Nov 5. Dave trained the 2004 Older Pacer of the Year, Four Starzzz Shark who earned more than \$2.5 million over his career and was the 2004 Dan Patch Award winner.

Dominick R. Santarelli, 83, of Scranton, PA, died Oct 19. During his career, Dominick managed New Jersey's Lana Lobell Farm and Southwind Farms. During his years at Southwind, the farm stood the top two stallions in the sport, Artsplace and Valley Victory. He excelled in baseball and



football and was sought after by professional teams in both sports. He pitched several no-hit, no-run games and lost only one game in three years.

John Schuberg, 80, of Perrysburg, OH, died Nov 24. John was elected to the USTA board in 1986 and served for 25 years representing District 2. During that time, he was very instrumental in the hiring of the past two CEOs of the USTA. He was active in harness racing as an owner, driver and trainer since 1955 throughout Ohio, Michigan and Indiana. He was an expert at buying young stock and producing "racehorses."



Kimberly Sholty, 57, of Westport, CT, died Nov 23. Kim was a daughter of the late Hall of Famer, George Sholty. She earned a degree in finance at the University of Florida before pursuing a successful career on Wall Street. Kim was active in PTA and was also an admired leader in Boy Scouts.



Charles M. "Chuck" Stillings Jr, 66, of DeLeon Springs, FL, died Oct 6. Chuck began working with horses while still in high school. During his nearly 50 years in horse racing, he bred, owned, and trained over 100 horses. His most recent prize winner, Cumberland Gap, earned him the 2018 Ohio Breeders Championship at the Delaware County fair in September. Chuck also worked as an air traffic controller for 20 years.

Frances "Frankie" Thornbury White died Aug 3. Frankie was well known throughout harness racing for her work at the Lexington Selected Yearling Sale office and before that, for many years at the Tattersalls office in Lexington. She was also the wife of Tom White, a member of the Communicator's Hall of Fame. The couple was married 60 years. She was a faithful and active member of Maxwell Street Presbyterian Church.

Wallace W. Wimbrow, 80, died Nov 2. He worked for NASA security for ten years and then moved to Delaware and was employed by Shellhorn and Hill, Inc. Wallace trained and drove Standardbreds for many years. He drove on the Grand Circuit, as well as at Rosecroft, Harrington and Ocean Downs. He had such a great love for the horses and the sport; he would often go to the races, just to watch the horses.

Joe Edward Black, Sr, 82, of Pinckney, MI, died Oct 27. As a young boy, Joe picked cotton in Tennessee. Later, he joined the U.S. Army where he received medals for Good Conduct and Sharpshooter (Pistol). Joe began his career in harness racing in 1968.



He trained many of Howard Niles horses before hitting it out on his own. Doctor Keeran was a big part of getting Joe's stable going. They worked together for many years, helping lame horses with rest and retraining.

Robert B. Cottrell, 84, died Nov 22. Robert was one of the leading trainer/drivers at Buffalo Raceway, Batavia Downs and Vernon Downs during the late 1950s through the 1970s. He will be missed by many longtime friends, many of whom worked with him in equestrian training and harness racing.
